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



Ride Coordinators Comments

Greetings all. In late 2021 I was asked to join Fleurieu committee. I agreed and was given the Ride Coordinator role. It has been an interesting year of managing this position. Firstly, I had to get people to lead rides then manage the email distribution process called Mailchimp. This system does have other names, none of which are printable.

I found that once members had agreed (sometimes under a little pressure) to lead a ride there are several processes that need to be undertaken before that ride. I have been very fortunate, as all ride leaders sent me a draft of their ride well in advance so I could compile and add maps as needed,

The important part of early advice is so I have a good idea of where we are going in case the ride leader cannot make it on the day and I have to fill in. Furthermore, this year the choice of rides has been well thought out and covered several different areas. The leaders are thinking about the rides and how to make them interesting whilst remaining "rideable" by all members.

Then there is the morning sermon. Making sure everyone if across what we are doing and reminding them of our responsibilities as riders and a branch/club. In addition, trying to make it interesting. Then ensuring everyone understands corner marshalling and the responsibilities of the ride leader and tail end Charlie, especially if you are a CM and have a small one. I think I now have a good idea of what is needed each week and I have introduced the speed camera locations for the area.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all ride leaders for their input and leadership. A special mention must also be added for Poida (the orange umpa lumpa) in his role as TEC. There were a couple of occasions when he had to ring myself and have the RL stop and regroup due to fall or incorrect turn.

There have been about a dozen different ride leaders this year. Many of those have already agreed to lead again in 2023. But if you want to lead there is always a space to fill, but no pressure yet.

The other part is the ride reports. Some leaders do not wish to write them themselves and this is not an issue, I and the Beautiful Marie are always happy to write them on your behalf. Photos of rides are also a great addition.

Be it Sunday, Wednesday or Friday rides keep the information and photos coming to me and everyone will see what a great time we have.

My beautiful wife Marie has been a great support through this year with the ride communications preparations and dealing with my early angst of Mailchimp. I love Marie.

Indian Motorcycle History

1897 - 1952

In 1897, industry pioneer George M. Hendee founded a bicycle production company called the Hendee Manufacturing Company. Along with co-founder and chief engineer Oscar Herdstrom, Hendee opened the company's first factory in downtown Springfield in 1901.

The first Indian motorcycles, having chain drives and streamlined styling, were sold to the public in 1902. In 1903, Indian's co-founder and chief engineer Oscar Hedstrom set the world motorcycle speed record of 56 mph. In 1904 the company introduced the deep red colour that would become Indian's trademark.

What followed was half a century of unparalleled growth in motorcycle production and innovation, and foundational leadership in curating a true American riding culture. In 1923, the company changed its name from The Hendee Manufacturing Company to The Indian Motocycle Company – no 'r' in 'motocycle' when the word was first used with the name Indian. Less than two decades later, Sturgis, South-Dakota -based Jackpine Gypsies rider group held a race called the Black Hills Classic, which evolved to become the world's largest motorcycle rally.

Over its early years of existence, the company displayed extraordinary resilience as its trailblazing success in innovation and on the racetrack continued despite the advent of the Great Depression and two world wars. In fact, not only did the brand survive these tumultuous times, but its considerable contribution to the war effort during WWI and WWII provided essential vehicles to both the American and French troops on the ground.

1953 - 2010

Indian Motorcycle's halt in production of all models in 1953 kicked off a five-decade break in the company's rich history. Although several efforts during this era of brand history saw the trademarked 'Indian Motorcycle' name on several different imported bikes, these tumultuous times plagued by several major changes in ownership proved to be a real divergence from the overall path to success laid by Indian Motorcycle's original trailblazers. The period of uncertainty finally ended when Polaris Industries acquired the Indian Motorcycle Company in 2011, decisively ushering-in a period of renewed success reminiscent of the company's early sustained growth.

2011 & Beyond

The 2010's have been a decade full of exciting development and growth for Indian Motorcycle. Revitalized by the company's acquisition by Polaris Industries in 2011, Indian Motorcycle has since rejoined the trail blazed by the company's early pioneers in the first half of the 20th century. The present-day Indian Motorcycle Company combines high-performing technological innovation, rewarding partnerships, and an ever-expanding line-up of authentic, iconic bikes.

Dehydration & Fatigue for Motorcyclist

With the weather starting to get hotter, it is important to remind ourselves of the dangers of dehydration and the safety implications due to fatigue and a lack of concentration whilst we are riding. This can be easily overcome by drinking enough fluids, this includes plenty of water but does not include coffee, alcohol, or sugary drinks etc.

This was recently highlighted on a Ulysses Club overnight ride, when one of the group's riders had a big night and followed it the next morning with multiple cups of coffee. The result was the rider starting to lose control of the motorcycle and finally collapsing on the roadside in a remote area, before being transported to hospital where they were given intravenous fluids and told that they were lucky to have survived.

Water makes up the largest component of the human body representing 45% to 70% of our body weight. For example, a 75 kg person would contain 45 litres of water, representing 60% of body weight. Any excessive change in the normal body water balance, such as fluid loss causing dehydration can be a serious outcome for the motorcyclist.

We lose body water daily through normal tasks such as breathing, sweating, urinating and some medications for example. A reduction of only 1% can start to impair our body's normal temperature regulation system and dehydration will kick in. During heat exposure, body water is primarily lost as sweat. Individuals can sweat anywhere between 800 mL to 1.4 litres per hour. People normally do not perceive thirst until a deficit of approximately 2% body weight loss has resulted from sweating. Thus, thirst provides a poor indicator of body water needs during rest or physical activity.

When individuals are encouraged to drink fluids frequently during heat exposure, the rate at which we can replace the fluids by mouth is limited by the rate at which fluids can be absorbed from the stomach to the intestines (where the absorption process starts to take place).

Fluids can only empty from the stomach at a maximum rate of approximately 1 to 1.2 litres per hour.

The important message is that once dehydration occurs, it becomes more challenging to rehydrate adequately by drinking water. The key to preventing dehydration for the motorcyclist is to begin consuming water before going on a ride and to maintain hydration by taking frequent drinks of water during the ride.

Just remember that you can sweat more per hour on a hot day than what your body is capable of absorbing. That is why it is critical to maintain your water intake before, during and after the ride.

First Aid

Keep an eye out for common signs (something you see) and symptoms (something you hear, or the patient tells you.) of dehydration. Also keep in mind that each person may experience symptoms differently, they include:

Less frequent urination & dark in colour

- Thirst
- Fatigue & light-headedness Confusion
- Dry mouth
- Frontal headache

DRINK, DON'T SIP

Cool the individual down and get them to drink as much water as possible (may include electrolytes). Be aware that large amounts of oral fluids may increase bloating, nausea, and vomiting due to the delays in stomach intestine absorption rate. In this case, the individual needs urgent medical attention and intravenous (I.V) fluid replacement. Please remember that the volume of oral fluids ingested typically must at least equal the volume of fluid lost.




