

### **Can-Am Spyder**

The Can-Am Spyder is a three-wheeled motorcycle manufactured by Can-Am motorcycles, a division of Bombardier Recreational Products. The vehicle has a single rear drive wheel and two wheels in front for steering. The Spyder uses an ATV-like chassis and has traction and stability control, and ABS. The manufacturer refers to it as a "roadster," but in technical terms, it is more of what has been traditionally called a trike.

All Spyder models have storage space under the hood at the front of the vehicle, referred to as a frunk. Top rear dual helmet boxes and other accessories for the Spyder are also available. The Spyder front and rear brakes are both actuated by the same foot pedal, a reverse gear, power steering and an optional electric shift semi-automatic transmission.

The Spyder was formerly produced in both manual and semi-automatic transmission styles. As of the 2020 model year, all Spyder models are equipped with a semi-automatic transmission and Ryker models are equipped with fully automatic continuously variable transmissions (CVT). The manual transmissions follow the standard motorcycle design: a left-foot-actuated shifter and a left-hand-actuated clutch. The semi-automatic transmission models use a paddle-shifter on the left-hand grip, and it will automatically downshift as the vehicle slows, but upshifting must be manually performed by the rider.



#### **Better Traffic Visibility**

A Spyder has a unique design and shape, one that is sure to catch your eye. This is a huge plus on the road because people will notice you! Most 2-wheel motorcycle accidents happen because drivers typically don't see them, they are looking for other cars and/or trucks. With a Spyder you have a wider vehicle then the typical 2-wheel motorcycle, making it easier to see you. In addition, a Spyder isn't narrow enough to fit in between cars that are driving in traffic, resulting in less crashes.

#### Less Swerving

On a Spyder you handle it much like driving a car. You use the handle bars, not your body. With a 2wheel motorcycle, you ride it like a bicycle, you use your body and you lean as you steer.

#### Comfort

Spyder's now offer extra-long touring floorboards to ensure the rider is comfortable for those longer rides. The seating features lower centre of gravity plush rider and passenger heated seats. The suspension calibration improves riding dynamics. The superior wind protection allows for you and your passenger to put more distance between each stop on your adventure.

#### Balance

Spyder's are more stable than a motorcycle and they do not require you to hold them steady at traffic lights. The stability definitely makes it easier to ride in bad weather or on sandy/gravely terrain than a motorcycle. In addition, a Spyder is less likely to tip over because it has three points of support. Extra stability can open the door to more people who would not normally be confident enough to experience the open highway.

#### Style

As mentioned before, the Spyder has a unique look to it. The design is full of rich textures and finishes along with premium LED headlights and full color LCD displays. Every last detail is unique and tailored with the rider in mind.

#### Support for the disabled

Due to health and/or physical issues some people are unable to ride motorcycles and that often times gets overlooked.

#### Support for the elderly

Helping keep a generation of born to run riders on the roads.

### Fact or Fiction

I was having a yarn with a long-term Club member recently and he raised a point about members, particularly newer ones, who don't understand who NATCOM are, or what they do. He pointed out that some members have almost no idea about their Club's structure, or how it is run.

Maybe we should begin at the beginning; NATCOM (the National Committee) is you! The NATCOM is a committee of seven members who are elected to run the Club's affairs on behalf of the rest of the members who live all over Australia, and beyond.

To help familiarise you with how things work within the National Committee and National Administration Office, we thought we'd try and dispel some popular myths, while providing you with a few facts along the way. So here goes:

**FICTION -** NATCOM are paid to look after our Club, just like any Board of Directors.

**FACT** - NATCOM members are not paid. They are volunteers. The Club does reimburse them for travel, accommodation and meal expenses when they attend NATCOM meetings, and a monthly allowance is paid to cover telephone calls and internet access. Sometimes, reimbursement may also be approved for a specific presentation or meeting where a NATCOM member's presence is required. And before you ask; No, they have to buy their own drinks when they attend functions!

**FICTION** - At the National Rally each year there is an Extended NATCOM Meeting, which is one of the six meetings mandated by the Constitution. Does that mean then, that NATCOM members are reimbursed for attending the National Rally?

**FACT** – No. While NATCOM members are <u>expected</u> to attend the National Rally and AGM, they pay their own way, and they are not reimbursed.

FICTION – NATCOM members handle the day-to-day operations and administration of the Club.

**FACT** – The Club currently employs one permanent staff member. As the name implies, our Administration Office staff look after general administrative tasks such as enquiries, membership processing, warehousing, dispatch and AGM Event registrations as well as assisting our (volunteer) Editor with the production of the Club's quarterly journal, *Riding On*.

**FICTION** – NATCOM members work at the National Administration Office in Sydney.

**FACT** – The National Committee members live and work in separate Australian states and territories. Some are employed in normal 9-5 jobs, others run their own businesses and one or two thought they were retired ... before they were elected to NATCOM!

Occasionally, individual NATCOM members will spend a day or two at the National Office completing specific jobs that require them to be 'on site'. They try to make these visits coincide with regular NATCOM meetings (which are usually on a Saturday) so that travel expenses can be minimised.

### Push Bike Matters & Law

The road cycling events calendar is starting to increase across SA and is likely to get even more intense in the build up to the Tour Down Under. This means an increase in push bikes on the road when we are riding. Now some push bike riders remain considerate of other road users where others become more belligerent than usual. If you come across a group of push bike riders with competition numbers on their backs then it is likely they are more interested in the competition than the road rules:

- > Expect sudden movements from the riders.
- > Riders overtaking others wider than 2 abreast.
- > Large groups across the road on corners.
- Groups of vehicles that have slowed down because of the riders, sometimes at awkward locations.
- > Support vehicles travelling as slow as the bikes
- > Officials with signs suddenly stopping traffic to allow bikes to cross the road.
- > Vehicles coming towards you that are crossing double barrier lines to get around push bikes.
- Remember when passing a push bike in a "country" location there must be a 1 metre to 1.5 metre distance between the bike and your motor bike, depending on the road speed limit.
- You can legally cross double barrier lines and solid single lines to pass push bikes, only when safe to do so



The South Australia Road Rules state:

Two cyclists may ride abreast on a road, but they must not ride more than 1.5 metres apart. Three or more bicycles must not ride abreast, but a cyclist may overtake two cyclists who are riding abreast.

Drivers are required to give a minimum of one metre when passing a cyclist where the speed limit is 60 km/h or less or 1.5 metres where the speed limit is over 60 km/h.

The Highway Safety Code invokes motorists' good judgment: Article 344 states that a driver may cross a solid single or double line when overtaking a cyclist, provided it can be done safely.
